"Thrills, Spills, and Stills: Running the Rio Yaqui in Northern Sonora, Mexico."

Presented by Paul and Sherry Barrett

The Rio Yaqui drainage is in northeastern Sonora, near the border with Chihuahua. Beginning at the farming town of Granados it is a 110 mile run to the town of Sahuaripa. The paddle/drag begins on the Rio Bavispe, and two main tributaries, the Rio Bacadehuachi at RM 30 and Rio Aros at RM 60 confluence the run. At the Bavispe/Aros confluence the river becomes the Rio Yaqui.

Although close to the border with the United States, the run is isolated from most human populations but boasts bald eagles, military macaws, and even jaguars among the wildlife.

River Trip Reports/ Stories

Rio Grande: White Rock Trip Report, by Adam Hill "The high flow this spring left some nice sandbars for camping in the lower stretches. There's a sandbar across from Alamo Canyon that would be a great camp for 50 people! It will likely be gone or overgrown next year, but for this fall/winter it's nice. Capulin Canyon is freshly blown out again so you can camp there an access painted cave easily, and Cochiti Canyon is also clear and good for camping."

The day the Rio Grande turned fluorescent yellow By Robert Robey

A typical late summer day in New Mexico and to celebrate the return of Marie Blatnik from Caltech back to Los Alamos, we headed for the racecourse section of the Rio Grande. We were expecting low water, but with that clear dark green translucent color typical of the season. When we arrived, imagine our surprise to see the river a bright fluorescent yellow (picture). We put on and ran the river with this unsettled feeling. All went well with Rob Aiken, Marie and myself hitting the lines all the way down to Big Rock. At Big Rock, Rob hit a great line through the slot to the right of Big Rock. Marie and I decided to run toilet bowl. There was just enough water to stay to the left over the shelf. I led and made it fine. Marie didn't stay enough left and

dropped into the slot next to Big Rock and flipped coming out. The hole sucked her in next to the shelf and she lost her paddle, so she attempted a hand-roll, almost coming up, but hitting the shelf, knocking her back down. At that point the river gods popped the paddle back into her hands and she rolled back up beautifully.

The epilogue. The color of the river was due to heavy rains broaching the Questa mines tailing ponds. We suspected as much while running the river, but it was confirmed in the news with pictures of front-loaders clearing roads from the mud overflow near Questa. The sediment was very fine and a bright yellow that seemed to stay suspended in the water for a long time. The river had been clear the day before and from reports was clear just hours before we arrived. Sections downriver were still clear. There were other boaters on the river and commercial trips too. But I haven't seen any acknowledgement of the river contamination from the state environmental department, environmental groups or press.

Below is a lot of information on Club Trips, don't be intimidated, read the below info and remember you're just an organizer.

Why Club Trips?

What is the purpose of the kayaking club if the club does not hold club related activities. AWC organized trips were common in the past and have since slowly moved to the Meetup.com website, as the organizers feel that might somehow reduce the liability involved in the organization of a trip.

I am happy to organize our November Club trip. Who can go on our club trip? Many of our club trips in the future will be open to members and non-members. However this November's "Turkey

Bash" Club trip will be open to club members only. Do you know someone who wants to come? Great send them to the website and have them join the club.

What are the responsibilities of the trip organizers?

Organizers who are unable to fulfill their trip commitments should obtain a substitute organizer and notify the Newsletter Editor and Webmaster as soon as possible, if you have internet access, please post on the club bulletin board.

MONTHS BEFORE THE TRIP

Determine put-in and take-out points. Determine rendezvous time. Select an alternate trip in case of high or low water, where possible. Select camping arrangements, if required. List the expected level of difficulty, wet/dry suits? Closed boats? Mail/E-Mail this information to the newsletter editor and Webmaster in time to be published just before the trip. Organizers who are unable to fulfill their trip commitments should obtain a substitute organizer and notify the Newsletter Editor and Webmaster. If you have internet access post a notice on club bulletin board.

WEEK BEFORE THE TRIP

If conditions change choose an alternate paddling location for the trip. Maintain a roster of persons signed-up for the trip with names, phone numbers, e-mail addresses and experience in order to notify them in case of a change before the trip. Do not just cancel the trip and then paddle somewhere else.

DAY BEFORE THE TRIP

Find out the water level, make sure it is suitable for the trip as planned. If you cannot go on the trip please find another organizer.

Guests may join us on our trips. However, please encourage them to join our club for their own safety and enjoyment. If the participant is an active member of another club like Rocky Mountain Canoe Club, they are welcome on any of our scheduled trips. **Club members enjoy the camaraderie, the mutual liability waiver and the satisfaction knowing that their dues are supporting the club services that they are enjoying.**

Read the American Whitewater Safety Code.

DURING THE TRIP

Please note that "Trip Organizers" are just that, organizers..

All on-the-river "responsibilities" are those of the individual or the group as a whole. In fact, the "trip organizer" does not have to go on the trip. They're simply the main contact that coordinates the meeting time and place, and puts interested participants in contact with each other. That is as far as their responsibility goes.

AFTER THE TRIP

Ensure that a trip report is written and sent it to the newsletter editor as soon as possible.

Trip Participant's Responsibilities

MONTHS BEFORE THE TRIP

Pick a trip to match your skills and ability. Rate yourself with the * <u>Keel-Haulers Self-Rating</u> <u>System</u>. Do not pick trips that are rated more than 3 points beyond you or your partner's ability.

*Currently this list is not all encompassing to our local rivers but it does have several listed in the west. Know your score. If you are in doubt of your skills and abilities please communicate with the trip organizers to help make a determination, for your safety and the group's safety. Remember there will always be other trips within your skill set in the future.

WEEK BEFORE THE TRIP

Notify the trip organizer by phone or e-mail of your intent to join the trip. No one's paddling ability or knowledge of the river exempts them from this common courtesy. Plan your food, transportation and rendezvous. Please become a club member, guests are welcome but encouraged to join.

Read the American Whitewater Safety Code.

Double up, help conserve fuel. Try to take as many boats and people with you as possible. Let the trip organizer know if you need transportation or if you can bring someone else with you. If you have to cancel out of the trip, let the organizer know as soon as possible, so that the other paddlers won't waste time waiting for you to arrive.

DAY OF THE TRIP

Meet promptly at the appointed time. Check to see that you have all equipment with your boat before starting on the shuttle. Plan to participate in the auto shuttle, and let the group know when you are ready. If you have a physical disability, are under a doctor's care, or may need medicine, let the group know.

DURING THE TRIP

Know and practice the American Whitewater Safety Code.

AFTER THE TRIP

Leave the river and its surroundings cleaner than you found them. Drive home carefully; you will be tired.

DISCLAIMER

Remember that water sports are a potentially dangerous activity. Each participant is responsible for assessing his or her own ability and from refraining from activities that are beyond their

limits. The club, its officers and members simply cannot and do not take responsibility for anyone when they are participating in a planned or spontaneous club activity.

Only YOU are responsible for your actions and safety. Read the <u>American Whitewater Safety</u> <u>Code</u>. It's purpose is to serve as a guideline for river trips.

As stated in the code,

"A river trip should be regarded as a common adventure by ALL participants.... Participants share the responsibility for the conduct of the trip and each participant is individually responsible for judging his or her own capabilities and for his or her own safety as the trip progresses. Participants are encouraged (but are not obligated) to offer advice and guidance for independent consideration and judgment of others."

Remember, water sports are a potentially dangerous activity. Members assume any and all risk when choosing to participate in an activity and the Adobe Whitewater Club, its officers and members are not responsible for any damages resulting from such participation.
